### **Projects posted on web site**

We met many Rotarians at the past few RI conventions who have various hearing loss projects, mostly involving screening for young people and distribution of hearing aids. We have posted two projects on our site that were brought to our attention. We encourage clubs to share their hearing projects with us for posting on the RfHR website.

“Silent Melody” is a child screening project of the Rotary Club of Madras Esplanade, Chennai, India spearheaded by PP Murali Rao. “Hi Hopes” is for deaf and hard of hearing children up to three years. Support, education and weekly home visits are included. Claudine Storbeck, PhD, and member of the Johannesburg New Dawn Rotary club in South Africa founded and heads up this project.

We urge Rotarians to review these projects and perhaps interest your own club in helping these outstanding Rotarians in other parts of the Rotary world.

We continue to assist the Deafness Research Foundation in their effort to contact members of congress to seek funding for hearing loss research. ## **Woodstick 2008**

On November 2<sup>nd</sup> 2008 at the Seattle, Washington Juanita High School Field house at exactly 2:45 PM drummers in 9 US and Canada locations were connected via video and played together for six minutes. Exact numbers are not available at this date but it is believed that approximately 3000 drummers played at the same time which will be a long standing record. Efforts are being made to have the Guinness Book of Records include this event. While we initially hoped to enlist the other cities in support of hearing loss we were limited this year to sharing any profits in Seattle with Music4Life, a Seattle Rotary project and Virginia Merrill Bloedel Hearing Research Center (VMBHRC). We think that profits again this year will be at a minimum when all bills are paid. We may search for another fund raiser that has a better opportunity of raising funds. The event did gain a great deal of publicity and the staff at VMBHRC joined with Rotarians for Hearing Regeneration as volunteers for the event, all reporting a good time.

## **Three year strategic plan**

Our board, led by Sydna Koontz has decided that we need to do more planning and set some reachable goals for the future. Sydna has led discussions in two recent board meetings and we hope to finalize our efforts in early February. We will post the three year plan on our web site when it becomes available.

## **Birmingham, England**

We will again exhibit in Friendship Hall at the Rotary International Convention in Birmingham, England. We urge our present members to visit our exhibit booth and hopefully many Rotarians who have hearing loss or an interest in regeneration research will be joining up with us during the convention.
